While each site is independent with a varied schedule, each site will offer a variety of activities daily. - [Northwest Community Center After School Program & Middle School Teen Center and Leadership Program](#); (815) 964-6885 – CCAP-eligible. Youth after school programming will be offered Monday-Friday for K-6th grade students from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. The program includes dinner, snacks, homework help, recreation activities, and much more! Middle School programming will be offered Monday-Friday from 4-6:30 p.m. Activities include mentoring, academic support, field trips, and speakers.

During the evening program, children are served a hot meal, enjoy music and a Bible lesson time to teach basic life skills, encourage the kids to do their best in school, and develop positive goals for their futures. At the end of each evening, the children leave with a bag of kid-friendly, non-perishable food items to help sustain them when they are away from our program. Throughout the year we provide the children with important items such as coats, shoes, boots, socks, hats and mittens, hygiene supplies, blankets and pillows, flashlights, school supplies, and even birthday and Christmas gifts.

Tween/teen evening programming includes leadership program, computer lab access, open gym times, and specialty arts programming.

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Students who have aged out of Foster Care

They are assessed for permanent housing and a housing plan is developed. Housing assistance programs include **Foster Youth Housing Assistance Program**. Youth who have aged out of foster care aged 18-21 who are either homeless or having problems with housing receive support and services to help them become housed, no referral is needed. These same services are available to Department of Children & Family Services (DCFS) involved families with a referral from their caseworker.
- [Foster Progress](#) – Foster Progress empowers Illinois youth currently or formerly in foster care to attain a college degree and transition into adulthood successfully. Offerings include:
 - Mentoring and Scholarships – Get matched with a one-on-one college-educated mentor for support to finish high school strong and walk through the college application and financial aid process. Each time you meet with their mentor, you can earn \$100 in scholarship money to be used for enrolling in a post-secondary program.
 - Traverse – Youth who have graduated high school but are not sure of their next steps can join this gap-year program to discover their strengths and create a plan for their future. They will participate in monthly service projects and travel opportunities.
 - Training and Workshops – Caseworkers, caregivers, and educators can schedule in-person or online training for continuing education and professional development.
 - Advocacy – Removing barriers to youth growing into successful adults - whether in the child welfare system, in colleges' and universities' policies and practices, or in state and federal policies.
- [Winnebago County CASA](#); (815) 319-6880 – A Court-Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) is a trained community member who is appointed by a Juvenile Court judge to represent the best interests of a person up to 19 years of age who has experienced abuse or neglect whose case is brought before the court. Winnebago County CASA empowers volunteer CASAs to speak up for people under the age of 20 who do not have a voice – and to change a child's story. Winnebago County CASA exists to develop and maintain an effective, high quality CASA program to advocate for and represent people under the age of 20 in the juvenile court system who have experienced abuse or neglect.

Offers training, including FREE tuition up to \$13,000 for eligible students at 67 programs at Rock Valley College. Transportation and childcare assistance are also available. Offers resources to help individuals obtain employment. Helps connect job seekers to available jobs in Northern Illinois.
 - Services for Young Adults Out-of-School (16-24). Programs emphasize the importance of youth returning to school or obtaining a GED as a basic step on their road to success. Programs provide basic skills, GED instruction, tutoring, counseling, mentoring, career exploration, work experience (WEX) employment opportunities and job placement assistance. The programs also provide follow-up mentoring for at least one year after the youth exit the program.

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- Services for Youth In-School (14-21). Programs help youth become successful in school, enabling them to graduate and continue their education/training and/or gain employment. In addition to tutoring youth in school and counseling/mentoring the youth, all in-school programs provide career awareness and work readiness activities.
